

FUNCTIONAL DEPENDENCY

The functional dependency is a relationship that exists between two attributes. It typically exists between the primary key and non-key attribute within a table.

1. $X \rightarrow Y$

The left side of FD is known as a determinant, the right side of the production is known as a dependent.

For example:

Assume we have an employee table with attributes: Emp_Id, Emp_Name, Emp_Address.

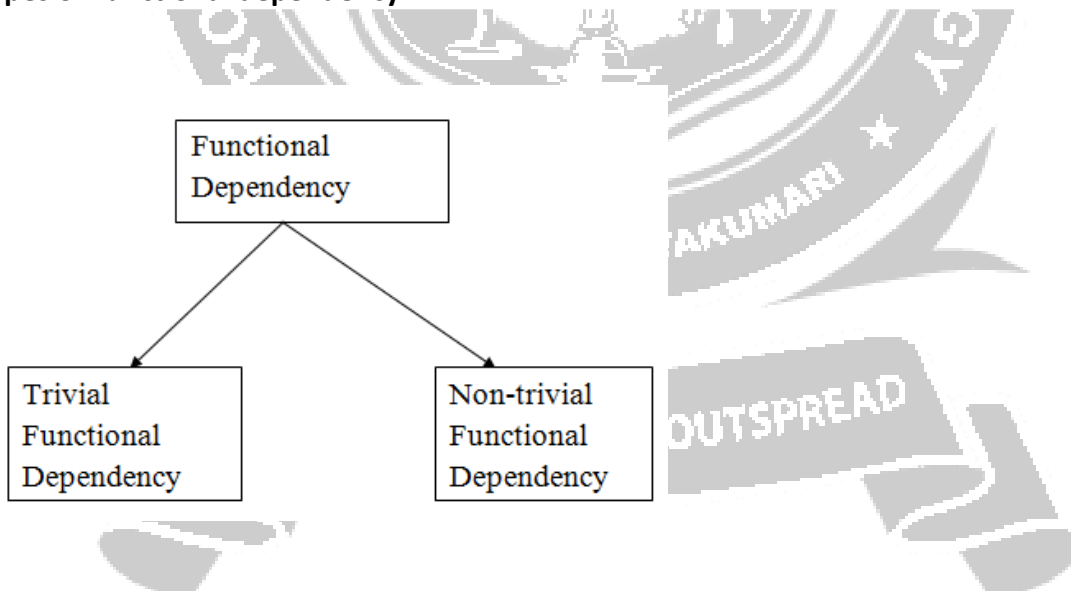
Here Emp_Id attribute can uniquely identify the Emp_Name attribute of employee table because if we know the Emp_Id, we can tell that employee name associated with it.

Functional dependency can be written as:

$$\text{Emp_Id} \rightarrow \text{Emp_Name}$$

We can say that Emp_Name is functionally dependent on Emp_Id.

Types of Functional dependency



1. Trivial functional dependency

- $A \rightarrow B$ has trivial functional dependency if B is a subset of A.
- The following dependencies are also trivial like: $A \rightarrow A$, $B \rightarrow B$

Example:

1. Consider a table with two columns Employee_Id and Employee_Name.
2. $\{Employee_id, Employee_Name\} \rightarrow Employee_Id$ is a trivial functional dependency as
3. Employee_Id is a subset of $\{Employee_Id, Employee_Name\}$.
4. Also, $Employee_Id \rightarrow Employee_Id$ and $Employee_Name \rightarrow Employee_Name$ are trivial dependencies too.

2. Non-trivial functional dependency

- $A \rightarrow B$ has a non-trivial functional dependency if B is not a subset of A.
- When $A \cap B$ is NULL, then $A \rightarrow B$ is called as complete non-trivial.

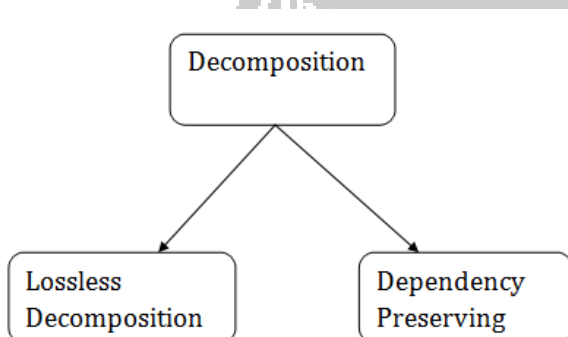
Example:

1. ID \rightarrow Name,
2. Name \rightarrow DOB

RELATIONAL DECOMPOSITION

- When a relation in the relational model is not in appropriate normal form then the decomposition of a relation is required.
- In a database, it breaks the table into multiple tables.
- If the relation has no proper decomposition, then it may lead to problems like loss of information.
- Decomposition is used to eliminate some of the problems of bad design like anomalies, inconsistencies, and redundancy.

Types of Decomposition



NONLOSS DECOMPOSITION Or (Lossless Decomposition)

- If the information is not lost from the relation that is decomposed, then the decomposition will be lossless.
- The lossless decomposition guarantees that the join of relations will result in the same relation as it was decomposed.
- The relation is said to be lossless decomposition if natural joins of all the decomposition give the original relation.

Example:**EMPLOYEE_DEPARTMENT table:**

The above relation is decomposed into two relations EMPLOYEE and DEPARTMENT

EMPLOYEE table:

DEPARTMENT table

Now, when these two relations are joined on the common column "EMP_ID", then the resultant relation will look like:

Employee ⋈ Department

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Hence, the decomposition is Lossless join decomposition.
