

Listening to Job Interviews

A job interview is a discussion between a candidate for a position and an employer's representative that is done to determine whether or not the candidate should be hired. One of the most popular ways to choose employees is through interviews.

Example:

Interviewer: Hi David, welcome to ABC Controls. My name is Tom.

Interviewee: Hi, I'm glad to have met you.

Interviewer: How are you today? It's nice to meet you too.

Interviewee: How are you doing? I'm doing great.

Listening to animated stories

Listening to Anecdote stories

Narratives can be either true or made up; anecdotal digression is a classic literary device, and even oral narratives usually use dramatic structure and subtly exaggerated details to delight the audience. Anecdotes are always spoken about true events that happened to real individuals, usually in a familiar setting.

Example:

Known for his electrical experiments, Benjamin Franklin made the revolutionary discovery of electrical charges in the atmosphere when he once flew a kite during a rainstorm. This audacious project demonstrated his curiosity and inventiveness and had a long-lasting effect on science.

Listening to event Narration

The use of written or spoken commentary to explain an event to an audience is known as event narration. A narrator is a specific individual who is used by the event's originator to transmit information to the audience, especially regarding the plot—the sequence of events.
